Jeremy is about to start pre-school and none of the teachers have experience with vision or hearing loss. Where should I go for help?

There are several agencies that can help you:

- The **Ohio School for the Deaf's** Early Childhood Outreach [www.ohioschoolforthe deaf.org/outreach.aspx] offers professional development and technical assistance for early childhood and pre-school educators and programs.
- **The Ohio State School for the Blind** [www.ossb.oh.gov] has several services in their outreach department that can help both parents and educators.
- **OCD BE** [www.ohiodeafblind.org] offers DBTAP (Deafblind Technical Assistance Program) consultations, a service where a consultant visits the school or home and then makes suggestions and recommendations for the education team. I feel like Carrie's IEP doesn't address our major concerns. How can we make changes?

The Ohio Department of Education has a publication entitled Whose IDEA is this? which explains the IEP process and the proper steps that need to be taken. The Ohio Coalition for the Education of Children with Disabilities (OCECD) is a great resource for parents when it comes to IEPs. The Coalition publishes several booklets explaining parents' rights and the IEP process.

Is it true that there is another registration in the state for children with vision loss?

Yes. The Center for Instructional Supports and Accessible Materials (CISAM) conducts the Federal Quota Registration of Blind Students in Ohio at the direction of the Ohio Department of Education. Using the number of children reported, funds are disseminated and administered by CISAM for specialized instructional materials (e.g. textbooks and equipment) through the American Printing House for the Blind.
